In 2014, volunteers cleared 30,000kg of litter from 113 beaches and 50 canals around the country – covering an area of 300km in total. Alongside fishing equipment and discarded household plastics, they found a bath, a trampoline and even a HM Prison Services toothbrush.







If you are going to the seaside for a day-trip this year, why not take a plastic bag with you? No, not to drop on the beach to kill a seabird or turtle! To carry away a bag full of litter.

Always ask an adult to help you. Always wear protective gloves. Don't touch anything you think might be dangerous.

Take a stroll along the beach, just before you intend to head for home. Wearing your gloves, pick up any bits of litter from the beach as you go. Place it in the plastic shopping bag you brought for the purpose.
